Buermann welcomed everyone to the meeting. Each Commissioner and staff introduced 19 themselves. 20 21 **PUBLIC COMMENT** 22 None. 23 24 **MINUTES** 25 B. Buermann asked if there were any amendments to the April meeting minutes. There were none. 26 27 H. Garrett motioned to approve the March 2017 minutes. Y. Dandurand seconded. Motion 28 carried. D. Borthwick Leslie abstained. 29 **COMMISSION REPORTS** 30 31 **Finance/Operations** 32 H. Garrett referred commissioners to the profit and loss statement included in packet. He 33 noted that the end of the year is coming and that the budget is pretty much on schedule. He 34 reported that the Commission is showing negative income, but only because the Commission 35 has not yet received expected payments. H. Garrett reported that the office will be buying a 36 new copier. C. Dimitruk reported that staff tried one that crashed and will be trying a new one. 37 It will cost 8-12 thousand dollars depending on which one they choose. C. Dimitruk also 38 reported that the Commission will need to do some roof repair sooner than later because a 39 portion of the standing seam came up and caused a leak in one office. This cost was not built 40 into the budget, so there may be some impact. The building committee is working to come up 41 with a solution to fix the roof. A. Voegele suggested that the Commission do the whole roof 42 and not spend money on piecemeal repairs and noted that the Commission has some 43 obligation to make the building as nice as the other buildings on the block.

40	G. Brunswick reported that the brownfields program has been keeping her very busy. She
41	highlighted three of many assessment projects: 1) the 1, 3, 5 Canada Street site in Swanton
42	Village will be redeveloped as an Ace Hardware. NRPC will be doing a second round of phase 2
43	assessment there. 2) NRPC will be doing a phase 1 assessment at 14 St. Armand Road in
44	Highgate Center, which the Town in interested in purchasing for redevelopment. 3) NRPC will

also do a phase 1 at 14 Stebbins Street in St. Albans City. There is a prospective purchaser interested in redeveloping that property. The Brownfields program will also be wrapping up the two area wide plans in June – one in the Stebbins, Catherine, Market Street area of St. Albans City and the other in the Northern Gateway of Swanton.

C. Dimitruk reported that as of right now, the FY 18 budget includes level funding for regional planning and municipal planning funds and regional planning commissions have \$300,000 to do expanded energy planning. In the middle of the fiscal year, NRPC will work with ANR on more planning to implement water quality projects.

REGIONAL PLAN AMENDMENT, ENERGY

C. Dimitruk gave a presentation on the recently completed Regional Energy Plan, which is drafted to be compliant with Act 174 and enhanced energy planning. The Energy Committee has spent considerable time developing this plan, and the Regional Plan Committee will be reviewing the plan on May 8. The enhanced energy plan will allow NRPC comments to receive substantial deference as opposed to due consideration under Certificate of Public Good proceedings. It is also intended to further the State's energy goal of 90x50, or 90 percent renewable by 2050.

C. Dimitruk reviewed data on the region's current energy use and targets for the future from the regional energy plan illustrated by smart graphics and charts. S. Jensen asked that Figure 5.7, the solar potential diagram be amended to show the impact of the solar development target on open/non-forested land, in addition to total land and prime solar land. C. Dimitruk agreed that this could be done.

Following the presentation, the Commissioners continued to discuss the energy plan. One commissioner inquired how many small wind towers would make up our wind target of 19MW. C. Dimitruk replied that it depends on location, size and efficiency but it would range from 20 to 50 towers. She also emphasized that the committee intended the wind target to be met on the later range of the time period – so closer to 2050.

C. Dimitruk referred the Committee to the adoption schedule for the regional plan amendment in their packets and reviewed the schedule. The first hearing will be on May 30, with the second hearing on June 28. The Board could adopt at the June 28 meeting if there are no changes made to the plan since the first hearing. C. Dimitruk noted that she needs endorsement of this adoption schedule to being the hearing process.

A. Voegele motioned to approve the regional plan adoption schedule and being the hearing process. Y. Dandurand seconded. Discussion: H. Garrett asked whether towns can start to incorporate the information from the regional plan into their municipal plans once the regional plan is adopted. C. Dimitruk replied that the quick answer is yes and she can elaborate when the motion is complete. Motion carried.

 C. Dimitruk explained that as part of the regional planning effort, the legislature appropriated funds for regional planning commissions to help municipalities do energy planning. She explained that NRPC will be working with 3 towns right away and that they will have funding to help more over the next 10 -18 months. In the meantime, NRPC will be providing all towns in the region with all the data produced for the regional energy plan translated to the municipal level by April 30. Each municipality will receive this data, including all the maps.

The regional plan amendment and the energy plan appendix will be on website. Also, there will be a workshop Monday night May 1st for anyone that wants to attend and learn more about the energy plan. It is at 6:30 at the Northwestern Medical Center's Green Mountain Conference Room.

C. Leach noted that there are 2 EV (electric vehicle) stations at the far end of Swanton parking lot and that all town and village street lights are LED. It was clarified that he believes the EV stations are rapid charge.

FY19 TRANSPORTATION PRIORITIES

C. Dimitruk referred the commissioners to the memo from B. Remmers on capital transportation projects in the packet. H. Garrett reviewed the details and the ratings recommended by the TAC for each project. C. Dimitruk asked the commissioners to take note of the Georgia Bridge B1, which has been a high priority for 5 years and is top priority this year. G. Bilodeau supported this priority by explaining the danger to public safety the bridge poses. C. Dimitruk elaborated on the Alburgh passage bridge (state bridge priority #3), explaining that the TAC wants to make sure the new bridge can accommodate walking, biking and fishing. The bridge is currently used for all these purposes, but new bridge design does not fully support them.

R. Noel motioned to endorse the FY19 Transportation Priorities as recommended by the TAC. D. Tanner seconded. A. Voegele suggested a friendly amendment by adding particular emphasis on the priority of the Georgia Bridge B1 replacement as it has been a priority for five years straight with no action. R. Noel and D. Tanner accepted the amendment. Motion carried.

I-35 CONSTRUCTION RESOLUTION

C. Dimitruk explained that the Eastern Townships of Quebec and Vermont partners are looking to pass a resolution to support the need and mutual benefit of completing AutoRoute 35 for, which connects I-89 to Montreal by 4-lane highway. There is a draft resolution prepared by FCIDC in the packet for the commission's endorsement.

A. Voegele motioned to endorse the draft resolution as prepared by the FCIDC. D. Tanner seconded. Discussion: The Commission discussed the seventh statement in the resolution relating to employment statistics for enterprises in neighboring regions. It was clarified that this memo was prepared so that it could be adopted by NVDA and CCRPC as well. G. Carton noted that he thinks the highway will have a great impact on reducing traffic on local roads in Quebec and Franklin County. R. Noel asked and A. Voegele confirmed that the route will connect with I-

89 in Highgate Springs. A. Voegele suggested that Vermont needs to start talking to our congressional delegation about improvements to the Highgate Springs border crossing to accommodate increased traffic. He also suggested that the memo be translated into French. C. Dimitruk explained that FCIDC would be doing that. Motion carried.
